Dear Parents,

Greetings! We're deep into the 2nd half of Fall Semester and I'm pleased to report that staff and students continue to impress all of us with their hard work and caring, respectful efforts towards one another.

**School report cards**-- not student cards, but the report cards issued by the state of Oregon telling you about our performance—are due to come home to you in early December. High test score performance (especially when weighed against statewide and comparable schools), improving attendance rates, good behavior ratings and steady high rates of student performance are the basic highlights. "Satisfactory" is the overall grade that is based more heavily on "improvement" over the last two years. Our site council/ department chairs/ staff and parent connection groups have all had an opportunity to look at the details. We are committed to maintaining our overall high performances in reading, math and writing. We also are taking more steps to improve the performance of those students who are not meeting state standards, especially focusing on improving reading and math work and making better connections for students with limited English proficiency or with learning disabilities. We welcome your thoughts and input regarding the report card and CHS' overall performance.

**Construction**-- as we move into late November, I am pleased to announce that: 1) We have the use of the new athletic field/ artificial surface for school classes and practices. We are immensely grateful to OSU for allowing our final football game to be played at Reser Stadium, on campus, in lieu of playing on a very muddy CV field; 2) The theater will be "signed off" to us for use and occupancy, perhaps as soon as 11/23; 3) North T building (woodshop, ceramics, and drafting) will in all likelihood be available for CHS students on 11/30. 4) AT South (automotive, fine arts, marine science and horticulture, construction) is scheduled for completion mid-December so that we can move into the space over winter break; 5) the parking lot has been totally paved, as of 11/18, and will be striped and released for parking, we hope, by 11/28.

Detail work will continue over the rest of the year, including adjustments to the energy efficient lighting and heating/air conditioning systems. But, the most important point through this all—we are very fortunate to have a very nice school in which to learn, work and play. Thank you to the Corvallis community for its support of our schools and students. Thank you to the students and staff who have been very patient and understanding in working through the "move".

**Budget Needs**-- As nice as it is to have a beautiful new school, we have the all-to-familiar paradox in 509J of not having adequate operating revenues to meet the needs of our students and expectations of our community. The building bond money has very limited uses – building construction and technology, furniture and equipment that will last for an extended length of time. I have asked staff to pull together a "wish list" for their most pressing needs to make it through this school year. We will be publishing that list through our listserv mailing and we appreciate your generous response at whatever level you can provide.

**Alcohol**-- "I just don't want us to have to bury one or more of our students, Jay, before we wake up and tackle this problem that impacts the entire community." Those are the words of a CHS student's father who was expressing the concerns of many parents, staff and community members over the growing use and abuse of alcohol by teens, in Corvallis and across the country. Risk of serious injury, traffic accidents, civil liability for injuries to others, binge drinking, alcoholism, poor academic performance, risk of sexual attack, and criminal records from acts done while intoxicated—all are the likely results of teenage drinking according to national and local experts. We share responsibility – students, parents, school and community, alike-- for these results. We at CHS are stepping forward to help focus on the problem and to search for possible solutions. We will be devoting an upcoming Parent Connection evening meeting to a roundtable information and discussion night, including guests from Benton County Mental Health and Law Enforcement. Please watch your emails for details.

**Caring and supporting**-- "I just appreciate the atmosphere, the attitude, the caring and respectful environment, the challenging academics and valuable activities you're school is giving my son in his first year at CHS." That's from a 9th grader's dad recently—it reflects what staff and students are aiming for and what we are all grateful for. Thank you—students, staff and parents—for your work and support of CHS. Have a safe and peaceful December!

### College Financial Aid Night

#### Learn how to "Make College Financial Planning Count"

**PARENTS**, you are invited to financial aid night on Tuesday, **December 6 at 7:00 p.m.** at CHS. This is the first time that we are using this organization but their other presentations have been very good. This financial aid night is not about filling out the FAFSA in a step by step process. That will be done at the financial aid night at Philomath High School on Wednesday, December 7 at 6:30 p.m. and all CHS parents are invited to attend that as well. My suggestion is that parents who are concerned about financial aid attend both sessions, it's probably a total time commitment of 3.5 hours and it may save parents thousands of dollars.

**Making College Financial Planning Count** is designed to help parents gain an understanding of how the college financing process works, including options available to develop a college funding strategy, how to plan for and manage all college costs and different types of financial aid available. Parents will learn how to send their child to college without risking their financial future.

"A student's entry into higher education after high school is a key transitional period for both students AND parents alike," said JR Cifani, Vice President of Monster's Making It Count Programs. "Our goal with Making College Financial Planning Count is to assist the parents by providing sound financial options and solutions for the major investment that a college education demands."

Last year more than 500 high schools across the country hosted Making It Count's college financing seminar. On average, parents rated the value of the ideas presented in the program a 9 on a ten-point scale. ## Flu Season Information

Parents – the flu season is upon us and the Center for Disease Control has provided some guidelines so we might avoid getting ill:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick, too.
- If possible, stay home from work, school and errands, when you are sick. You will help prevent others from catching your illness.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. It may prevent those around you from getting sick.
- Washing your hands often will help protect you from germs.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose or mouth.
- Students with a temperature of 100 degrees or higher must be sent home. Please make sure your student has a back-up plan if you are not available to transport them.



## Winter Formal Dance

Our CHS Winter Formal is scheduled for **Saturday, December 3 from 8:30 until 11:00 pm**. It will take place in our school cafeteria. All CHS sponsored dances are chaperoned by CHS staff and parents. Additionally the Benton County sheriff deputies patrol the areas inside and outside the dance. All school rules are in effect at all CHS sponsored dances.

### Parents FYI...

As a point of parent information, CHS staff wants to alert parents that the dances being held at places such as the fairgrounds and other buildings in the area are not CHS sponsored events. We have recently had phone inquiries about these events. Additionally, we want parents to know that events such as the junior campout and senior skip day, both spring activities, are not school sponsored events and consequently are not chaperoned by CHS staff.



## Dances/Social Events

The rules of good conduct and grooming shall be observed for school dances and social events. All students and guests must have photo identification and show it at the door. Student body cards are preferred. Additional charges may be added for students without student body cards. No guests in middle school or age 19 or over are allowed. All guests must be registered in the main office by the host student by the established deadline. The person inviting the guest will share responsibility for the conduct of the guests. Anyone leaving before the official end of the activity will not be readmitted. Breathalyzers may be used for students suspected of alcohol use.

## Guidelines for Student Visitors

- Visitation is not allowed if the guest student lives within 60 miles of Corvallis (Valley League principal's agreement).
- The guest must be of high school age and a "student in good standing" at their school.
- A "Visitor's Request Form" must be completed by the host student at least 24 hours prior to the visit (available in the main office).
- Any violation of school guidelines during the visit may result in both students being sent home.



## Additional Attendance Information

Please make arrangements with your student/s prior to school hours about Doctor & Ortho. Appointments, along with after school transportation.

"Unless there is an emergency" - all notes will be posted on student lockers. This also applies to "reminder notes". Please let your student know to check their lockers now and then just in case there may be a note on it.

An "Attendance Record" is posted outside of the Attendance Office. This record shows the students attendance for the previous day and current day. If you receive an "Automated" telephone call, stating that your student has missed one or more classes-and you feel this is an error, please have your student check the attendance record to see which teacher marked them absent. If this was an error, the student and teacher can resolve it.

## Attendance

CHS needs your help in reporting absences. If your child has been or will be absent, please call the CHS Attendance Office at 757-5888 as soon as possible. If you do not call, the computer will record your child's absence as unexcused. After 48 hours, absences cannot be excused. Notes are not accepted in place of a phone call.

Absences may be excused at the request of a student's parent/guardian because of illness, disability, illness in the immediate family requiring the student's presence, a family emergency, religious reasons or anything the school deems appropriate (up to 5 pre-arranged absences per semester). Students who are eighteen years old may request their own absences be excused.

Encourage your child to attend all classes; but if a class is missed, clear excused absences in a timely fashion by calling to give the exact date of absence, clock or period of absence and please spell the student's last name clearly.

Do you still get a phone call from the "Automated" call system? - even AFTER you have called the Attendance line to excuse your student? Please be aware that when you have called to excuse your student from being absent for a certain period class, your student still may have missed another class the same day, in which the Automated phone system will dial out for the class that is left unexcused.


